Know your rights

- According to the Basic Education Laws Amendment Act, 2011 (https://www.acts.co.za/south-african-schools-act/index.html) every child in South Africa has the right to an education. If your child has been denied access to education because they have special needs, you can challenge this.
- A public school must admit learners and serve their educational requirement without unfairly discriminating in any way: SASA Section 5 (1) (https://www.acts.co.za/south-african-schools-act/5_admission_to_public_schools)
- In determining the placement of a learner with special education needs, the Head of Department and principal must take into account the rights and wishes of the parents of such learner: SASA Section 5 (6) (https://www.acts.co.za/south-african-schools-act/5_admission_to_public_schools)
- Any learner or parent of a learner who has been refused admission to a public school may appeal against the decision to the Member of the Executive Council SASA Section 5 (9)
- Notwithstanding the provisions of any school admission policy, in the case of a learner who has not been placed at any school 30 school days after the end of the admission period, the District Director may place that learner at any school-
 - $\circ~$ (a) which has not been declared full in terms of Regulation 8, and
 - (b) in respect of which there are no remaining unplaced learners on a waiting list.

Get a letter from the school(s) stating the reasons why admission has been declined

Who is this for?

Read on if you and your child have **unsuccessfully applied to the school of your choice**. If you haven't applied yet you can use our school finder (/docs/wc-school-search.html) to find a school in your area.

This step will explain how you can get a letter with the school's reasons for rejecting your child. If you already have that letter, move on and find out how to appeal the decision.

What you need to know	Schools are not allowed to discriminate against learners during the admission process
	A parent has the right to choose which school their child can attend
	Use this draft () to write a request to the school, asking them for the reasons why admission has been declined

- If you are not sure of the school's contact details, use ourschool finder (/docs/wc-school-search.html) to get the email address and telephone number of the school you want to contact.
- In order to take this matter further you need to request a formal letter from the school stating why your child was denied access. We've created a draft letter () you can use as a starting point. Make sure to fill our all the relevant details and send it to the head of the school(s) your child was denied access from.
- The process of getting the letter often takes between 6 and 7 weeks. You can use ourhandy reminder service () to help you remember to follow up with the school in due course.
- If the school principal rejected your application because the school is unable to cater for your child's special-needs, then the governing body might be able to intervene. For example, if your child needs wheelchair access, and the school does not cater for this, then they could deny access. In this case the governing body could adjust the school's budget to make accomodations for the work required to add wheelchair access.
